Call Selectmen's Meeting to order.

Paul York called the meeting to order.

2. Town Manager's Report

3. Selectmen's Items

Betty Austin said that she hopes to see many people at the parade and ceremony on Monday to support our veterans.

Roger Staples said that there was a sidewalk Committee Meeting last week. Another one will be scheduled for next month.

Charles Robbins asked people to celebrate Memorial Day responsibly. He thanked current and past in the armed services.

Todd Smith said he hoped to see everybody at the parade to honor our veterans. He said he likes seeing a crowd at our meetings. He mentioned Chief Bucknam and the attention he is getting on his Facebook posts. He also said there have been a lot of kids on the baseball fields recently, taking the opportunity to get out and play.

Paul York said it is Memorial Week. He asked people to pay attention, with a lot of people out traveling this week.

4. Department & Committee Reports

Chief Howard said that he, Greg and Bryan did an inspection on the sewer line that runs from the church, across the Joseph property to Madison Avenue. Ted Berry came in with their cameras to inspect the line. It is a very serviceable 8" line. It is a savings for the project.

Roger staples asked if we would be hooking into this line on the East Madison Road.

Chief Howard said that we would. We wouldn't have to do any digging on that property. We would still have to put in a manhole.

Chief Bucknam said be smart, plan ahead, have a designated river over Memorial Day weekend. He said it has been an honor and a pleasure working with Betty Austin over the last four years. He will miss her.

Jeff Hewett said that we did get the 2021 Façade Grant. We are working to get that up and going as fast as possible.

5. Items by the Public

Kristina Cannon said that about 100 people came to Coburn Park to paint 45 bird houses for the downtown beatification project. We are working with the charter school to get some new street pole banners printed.

Main Street has started a community pride Facebook page called SKOW (Someplace Kind Of Wonderful). Just trying to get people excited about living in Skowhegan and recognizing that it is a great place to live and work.

She learned, in that last week, that we received two grants totaling \$30,000.00 for an entrepreneurial facility to help build the business accelerator program. Looking at a possible space downtown.

Paul York thanked Kristina Cannon and her crew for everything that they continue to do for Skowhegan. It is nice to see all of this movement.

Jason Gayne said that Charles Robbins did the auction for Hospice Volunteers. We were able to raise quite a bit of money.

Next Wednesday at Coburn Park Hospice Volunteers will have its Memorial Day Celebration. We do the planting of the garden. We will also be starting anew garden in Madison.

The chamber BBQ is gearing up. \$5.00 per car load to keep it affordable. There are 12 teams. The national judges are coming from North Carolina for this event. Another event, the main judge is flying on from Texas and will pull about 45 teams. There is a children's event that is free to enter. The winner of the children's event will take home their own grill.

We did the ribbon cutting for the community fridge a couple weeks ago. That it going well. Somebody did take 22 packages of hotdogs out of the fridge last weekend. Somebody is going to eat well this week. Marine Davis and Patsy Miller are the ones spearheading this. We do have an account setup for donations for that.

Betty Austin mentioned the nice signs that were painted for the sides of the fridge.

Jason Gayne said that the committee has started looking at the Memorial Day parade...to enhance it. We will be doing fundraising to make that parade much more elaborate. Working with the American Legion and some other folks on that.

Todd Smith said that refrigerator looks great.

Christine Almand said that it was an email that came from Waterville. They had asked for local towns to pass a similar resolution to what they had passed. We missed getting it on the last Agenda. It is also Asian and Pacific Islander month.

Todd Smith said that he did a little research on this. The first line refers to the shooting in Atlanta. The second paragraph talks about violence targeting Asian women. He read an article from the New York Times. The FBI director said that the motive is under investigation. He does not feel comfortable with that line in there that it was targeting Asian women. A May 11th article stated that the shooter has not been charged with a hate crime. He will not support this resolution, because it is not actually factual, based on his research.

Betty Austin asked if Todd Smith had a recommendation of how to word it.

Todd Smith said he did not know, other than striking the first two paragraphs. He said he of course would support a resolution that said don't shoot people, regardless of race.

17. Discussion regarding changes to COVID-19 precautions.

Christine Almand said that she provided a memo regarding the scale-back from the Maine CDC and the federal CDC. She also provided a spreadsheet to show what other municipalities are doing regarding masks in public buildings and whether or not their meetings are open to the public. Ours have been for months now. We also have recreation programs that involve children that are unable to be vaccinated at this time. We also need to know whether we are requiring or recommending masks for unvaccinated people. It would be impractical for us to require proof of vaccination from the public. Without physical distancing we could move these meetings back to the Council Room and it would make Town Meeting a lot easier to manage. You may want to consider masks a Town Meeting. The CDC recommends masks in large gatherings.

Betty Austin said that because we don't know who is vaccinated, we should ask people to wear masks. She would love to have our meetings back at the Council Room. She feels that people should wear masks at Town Meeting because it is a large gathering.

Todd Smith said he wouldn't remove the suggestion that people wear them, but he doesn't think that we need to make everybody wear them. By all means if you think that the masks work, vaccinated or unvaccinated go ahead and wear them. Since Monday, he has been in a number of businesses that have dropped the mask mandate. Some have signage on the door asking people to wear masks, but they are not requiring it. He likes recommended rather than required.

Charles Robbins asked about it being impractical to ask people for proof of vaccination.

Christine Almand said that we previously had employees watching the door. We could go back to that, but it does put a burden on the offices.

Charles Robins said he does like the line at the end of the memo saying that she will be requiring employees and boards and committees to provide proof of vaccination in order to allow then indoors with face coverings. He feels it should be an honor system. We should not be required to shoe proof of vaccination.

If we require masks for unvaccinated...she is going to expect that employees and boards and committees prove vaccination. If you are recommending then that could be a different story.

Charles Robbins said that it should be a recommendation. If people want to continue to wear a mask, then they should. If they don't want to, we need to take the honor system that they are vaccinated.

Todd Smith asked what legal obligations she is referring to. He read the Executive Order and he is not aware of any legal obligations.

If we require then for unvaccinated people...it is our obligation to make sure that our employees are being honest. This is what we are presenting to the public. We are saying that we are vaccinated, if we are not wearing a mask. That requires proof. The Dept. of Labor requires that employees have a HepB vaccination because of their job requirements. They don't allow us to take the employees word for it. We actually have to have the medical documentation. The Department of Labor has been silent on this, and we are not sure if they are going to provide further guidance.

Chief Howard said that the Fire Department requires either a HepB vaccination or a declination form. This protects us from liability. We have an obligation to protect our employees. Months ago he required either a COVID vaccination form or a declination. There was no direction from this board. As a department head he made that decision. If somebody decided not to get a vaccination, he has no problem with that. However, at that point he requires them to wear a mask. We have a limited number of firefighters. If they are out of work because they have COVID or have been exposed, that is a safety issue for the other employees and the residents of this town. He needs the means to protect his department and to ensure that they are ready to respond to calls. It is very important. He understands civil liberties, but he has to have the means to run his department. He is asking for some guidance. If you can't or don't want to prove that you are vaccinated, then wear a mask. It is the prudent thing to do.

Roger Staples said that he fully agrees with Chief Howard. We live in Somerset County. The virus is still out there, and its variants. Numbers are going down, but people are still getting infected. Somerset County has the lowest vaccination rate in the state at 35%. Skowhegan's Covid numbers are on the rise. As elected officials it is our job to protect the residents of Skowhegan. He recommends continuing to mask up in public buildings, public spaces and at large gatherings like Town Meeting. He doesn't feel like it is too much to ask at this point.

Todd Smith disagreed. He said he thinks that given the Executive Order, if we had a drink or a bag of chips here in front of us, we would not be required to wear a mask. We are no less harmful to one another like that than we are now. We don't need a separate set of rules. Once we leave here, we are going outside in a world that is mask-less. We don't wear safety glasses to protect the person beside us. If you feel you need protection, that is why the vaccine exists...that's why masks exist. You still have the opportunity to protect yourself. The real killer is not the virus itself...its substance abuse and suicide. We aren't asking people if they have depression, or substance abuse issues. We need to recommend, not require.

Charles Robbins said that it should be optional. If you want to wear a mask to feel safe, then wear a mask. If you ride a motorcycle and you want to wear a helmet, you wear one. There is no law saying that you have to wear a helmet.

Betty Austin said that she agrees with Chief Howard. We have employees, and we need to look out for our employees. Sometimes we need to have some rules. We have employees that have underlying issues that may make them more susceptible to this sort of thing, or someone that is pregnant. She doesn't think it is that egregious to ask people to be vaccinated or mask up.

Paul York asked Chief Howard if he is comfortable with no masks for employees with proof of vaccination.

Chief Howard said that the fire department is unique...almost all of his staff is vaccinated. There are very few who are not. If somebody chooses to not get vaccinated and they are exposed or get COVID, do we have to cover their sick time.

Charles Robbins said that two weeks ago masks were required in the Town Office. There was a COVID outbreak, and the Town Office closed down for two weeks. If masks work, the why did we get the COVID.

Christine Almand said that if somebody is unvaccinated (hasn't been two weeks since their last shot), and they have been exposed...more than 15 minutes cumulative...she has to send them home for ten days. What has changed since then, is the number of vaccinated people. When that occurred, three people were sent home. Two people stayed and worked. Fortunately, we were still able to provide some services to the residents. She can require vaccination proof. She cannot ask why. She cannot ask about any medical conditions. Those that are unvaccinated, when we have an exposure, create a burden. The more vaccinated people that we have, and having proof of that, helps us to manage and provide services.

Chief Howard said that they have had those issues at the fire department. Now that most of his employees are vaccinated it helps with managing exposures. We had an exposure a week and a half ago. Two firefighters were exposed...one was vaccinated, one was not. The unvaccinated person had to go home and get tested. Firefighters can't always wear masks in their job. During an emergency they are wearing air packs. There are times when the mask has to come off and then they can get exposed.

Paul York said he feels that we need to move forward. It is going to be out there for a while. It will be a while before people completely feel comfortable again. We do need to protect our employees. He doesn't know why it is a problem to show proof that you are vaccinated. We have been following CDC guidelines all along. He would like to see us not require masks for vaccinated people, and have employees show proof of vaccination. If you still want to wear a mask, go ahead and wear them.

Todd Smith said that by CDC guidelines it is recommended that unvaccinated people wear masks.

Jeff McCabe said that currently in state office buildings there is a requirement to wear masks. Having a clear policy is important. At the state house they still require the public and elected officials to wear masks.

Charles Robbins said that today Capital Police tried to keep a group out because they refused to wear masks. Then they were allowed in without masks.

Jeff McCabe said that elected official entering the state house, in many cases feel they are above the law. It is very frustrating. They sort of regulate themselves. If you or I were to go into that building and do that, we would be issued a citation. Those buildings do require masks. The penalty for those folks was the removal of their seat on a committee. They also

put the Capital Police, who are also public servants, in an awkward situation trying to physically remove them. He feels for the people working in those roles.

Charles Robbins asked what we are leaning towards...two separate rules for employees and residents.

Todd Smith said he would say no. if an employee comes off on their off time to register their vehicle, they are a citizen, and wouldn't have to wear one in that situation? He doesn't like the idea of creating weeds. Our second dose percentage is over 50%. By the next meeting that could be 70%.

Paul York said that there may be different sets of rules. Children under 12 are unable to be vaccinated. According to CDC guidelines, schools are still mandating masks.

Jason Gayne said that as of this afternoon 70.5% age 12 and older have their first shot. As a parent, it is very difficult for children to run around the basketball court with a mask on. To make them do that in baseball, where it's outside...he thinks it should be consistent across the board.

Christine Almand said that being consistent, all of the schools are requiring them.

Jason Gayne said that it is dangerous for 5, 6 and 7 year-olds to wear masks while running around. His son did it during soccer. It was a struggle for all of the kids. They couldn't breathe through their masks.

Paul York said that through this whole pandemic, the children did better with masks than the adults did. They have been doing it. It has become the norm for them. He also doesn't think it is too much to ask that employees show proof of vaccination or continue to wear a mask.

Charles Robbins asked if an employee wears a mask and comes into contact, do they have to quarantine.

Christine Almand said that is the current CDC guidelines. Masks are part of the solution...it's not the one thing that fixes this. It is a combination of things...physical distancing, masks and vaccinations. Masks are not to protect yourself. They are to protect others. Vaccinations are not 100%. Herd immunity happens at 70%. We are not there yet.

Charles Robbins said that whether or not you are wearing a mask, you have to quarantine if you come into contact with a positive case and are not vaccinated.

Paul York said that obviously when people are out it requires some tricky maneuvering. He doesn't think that having someone sit at the desk in the hallway is the answer. That caused a lot of issues and took away from their duties. He asked Christine Almand what her recommendation is.

Christine Almand said that she has employees on all sides of this. There are a lot of feelings and emotions about all of this. Following progress, she would require face masks for unvaccinated people in public buildings...she would require proof from employees. She would say that we would use the honor system with the public. She would hope that unvaccinated people would adhere to that policy. Programs that involve children under the age of 12, we should be good partners with our schools and follow the same guidelines that they are. This is what we have been doing all along. She would also say that we drop physical distancing. She feels that people can physical distance themselves at Town Meeting but masks should be required since it is a large gathering.

Roger Staples said that the general public would not be required to show proof of vaccination.

Christine Almand said that is a hard recommendation to make. She has been following what other towns are doing. Some will continue to require masks. Some are worried about the practicality of requiring proof, so they will just keep requiring them. A lot of managers are concerned that we still don't have enough immunity in the community. Ost of our interactions are brief. However, our meetings are not. Unvaccinated people are creating risk in those situations.

Roger Staples said he would agree to requiring masks at Town Meeting.

Christine Almand said that if an individual feels the need to physical distance, we do have the space in order to do that.

Betty Austin said that she likes Christine's recommendations.

A motion was made by Betty Austin and seconded by Roger Staples to go with Christine Almand's recommendations for COVID restrictions.

Vote: 3/2 (Todd Smith and Charles Robbins opposed)

Todd Smith asked to revisit this at the next meeting.

Christine Almand said she is looking for 70% vaccinated in our community. This is, and has always been, an evolving situation.

Trisha Austin asked how this would be managed with employees and what the consequences would be if not followed.

Christine Almand said that she would manage that.

Paul York said that he feels that we are moving in the direction that Todd and Charles would like to see. It's good that we aren't just taking a leap. Through this whole thing, we have changed as things have changed.

19. Other Business

Christine Almand said that she wanted to follow up on a comment from earlier from Todd Smith. If the board wishes to change who is eligible to be a Planning Board member, that is by ordinance, so it would need to go to Town Meeting. She would suggest that we discuss it further in the goal setting workshop.

Todd Smith asked about considering alternates on committees. Madison has alternates on their Planning Board. There is a valuable place for that. It was nice to see three people step up to be on the Planning Board.

Christine Almand said that Steve Connolly brought up alternates to her today. He had been to training where that was discussed. That also would require an ordinance change through Town Meeting.
